## Background

- The MIS and BAS systems were designed to support transactional applications running the NYISO market and settlement functions
- Evolutions to market rules and addition of new capabilities have expanded data storage requirements
- Lack of a final bill closeout process during recent years has necessitated maintaining on-line access of data to support settlement reconciliation
  - Implementation of DSS has eased reliance on MIS / BAS as a production data store

## **Operational Concerns**

- Volume of data stored in MIS and BAS systems leads to poor performance and presents an availability risk
- Cost of operations is impacted by maintaining large on-line data store
  - Procurement of additional storage
  - Management of multiple, large storage systems
- Redundant nature of transactional systems exacerbates data storage overhead
- Data restoration capabilities may be limited by large volumes of on-line storage



## **Solution Options**

- Limit data stored in transactional systems to time periods applicable to open billing periods
  - Archive historic data in off-line, secondary data store
- Maintain settlements data in DSS Settlements datamart for extended time period, as agreed with stakeholders
- Develop process by which Market Participants can request historical data to be delivered in intermediary format
  - Format and response time to be determined



## **Summary Recommendations**

- Market data applicable to open settlement periods will be available in the MIS and BAS through the end of the challenge period plus six (6) months
- Settlement data will be available from the DSS settlements datamart for a period of seven (7) years from market date
- Data from historical time periods, and not available in DSS, may be requested through Customer Relations and will be provided in CSV format



## Summary Recommendations (Cont.)

- Service level agreements for retrieval of historic data will be developed and agreed with Market Participants
- Technical approach is based on assumption that capability to re-spin bills after data retention period is not a requirement.
- Agreement needs to be reached on ultimate time period for the destruction of historic market data
  - Subject to applicable data / record retention policies
- Data / records that are, or may be, related to matters under litigation may not be destroyed
