#### Responses from Andrew Antinori as potential Vice-Chairperson of the NYISO Operating Committee

1. Please describe all the experience you have had in chairing groups or committees of diverse interests, with a list of such groups.

I am currently completing a one year term as Chairperson of the NYISO's Operating Committee. Prior to that, I was the Vice-Chairperson of the Operating Committee for a year.

During my tenure as a Senior Attorney at the NYISO, I was assigned to provide legal coverage for many NYISO stakeholder meetings including:

The Billing & Accounting Working Group

The Billing Issues Group

**Budget Standards & Performance Subcommittee** 

Project Prioritization Team Credit Policy task Force

**Business Issues Committee** 

Management Committee.

While I did not Chair these meetings, I was often looked upon to provide input as to the proper decisions regarding procedural rules as well as provide more substantive ideas to help the group reach consensus. My experience at NYISO stakeholder meetings, both while working for the NYISO and participating as a market participant, has made clear to me the necessity that everyone must have the opportunity to be heard and completely convey their position.

Beyond that experience, I have a long history of negotiating settlement agreements. The skills required to negotiate a settlement agreements are similar, if not identical, to the skills required to properly conduct a NYISO stakeholder meeting. Both situations represent a "zero-sum games" where if the parties can't reach agreement, the matter will likely get escalated to a higher tribunal. My experience as both a business man and attorney has developed those necessary skills.

2. Please describe the support of your organization for your assuming the position of Vice-Chairperson, and describe your ability to make the necessary time commitment.

NYPA has a long standing history of providing personnel to participate in the NYISO stakeholder process; with Bill Palazzo probably serving as the best example given he has been Chairman of the Operating, Billing Issue and Management Committees. Consistent with that long standing history, the Senior Vice President to whom I report has approved my application as Vice-Chairperson and empowered me to arrange my schedule as necessary to meet the obligations of being Vice-Chairperson if I am elected.

# 3. Please describe any training or experience you have had in mediation, ADR or consensus building.

I have always had a passion for consensus building / dispute resolution. From an academic perspective, I have taken two formal negotiation courses at Pace School of Law that were each three credit courses lasting a semester. I have also taken several commercial courses on negotiation and dispute resolution. From a more practical perspective, I spent six years working for Texaco inc. traveling internationally approximately 90% of the time negotiating License Agreements for a proprietary Gasification technology. Negotiation of License Agreements and subsequent disputes thereunder was literally 100% of my job for six years. I like to think I learned an awful lot about finding alternative currencies and developing consensus solutions from that experience.

#### 4. Please describe briefly why you would like to have this job.

I would like to be the Vice Chair of the Management Committee as a natural progression from the Chairperson of the Operating Committee because it will help round my knowledge of the electric industry while also allowing me to use the knowledge I currently have to hopefully make a positive contribution to the NYISO. I found the NYISO a very interesting and opportunity-filled place to work and look forward to hopefully being able to contribute something back to the NYISO.

5. Please describe briefly your organizations actual and/or potential business interests in the Northeast and New York State, including the sector in which your organization participates for purposes of NYISO governance.

NYPA is a corporate municipal instrumentality and a political subdivision of the State of New York (the "State"), organized under the laws of the State, and operating pursuant to Title 1 of Article 5 of the New York Public Authorities Law. NYPA is a "municipality" within the meaning of § 3(7) of the Federal Power Act. NYPA generates, transmits and sells electric power and energy. NYPA's customers include municipal and investor-owned utilities and rural electric cooperatives located throughout the state, high load factor industries and other businesses, various public corporations located within the metropolitan area of New York City; including the City of New York and the Metropolitan Transportation Authority. NYPA is a transmission owner, but participates in the NYISO governance as part of the Public Power sector.
