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Scope of Clean Up Project

- Improve clarity and consistency of Attachment Y, Sections 31.1 through 31.6 of the OATT
- Avoid substantive changes
- Facilitate the NYISO's Order 1000 compliance filing



Stakeholder Process

- Staff presented proposed changes to tariff sections at ESPWG meetings in February, March, April, and May 2012
- Stakeholders provided comments, which have been addressed
- Staff also presented clean up changes to Rate Schedule 10 and draft of Rate Schedule 13
 - Commenters raised concerns
- NYISO will propose Rate Schedules 10 and 13 in a future stakeholder process and FERC Section 205 filing
- Final clean ups to Sections 31.2, 31.5, and 31.6 presented to ESPWG on June 18



Types of Modifications Proposed

- Changes to improve consistency of terminology: substitute defined terms wherever applicable, such as "the ISO" instead of "the NYISO" and "the Commission" for "FERC."
- Organizational changes: Re-order some subsections as appropriate and remove redundant language; renumber paragraphs and internal section references accordingly.
- Clarifying changes: Modify language to clarify the intent or to conform the tariff to actual practice.
- Examples:
 - Section 31.2 (CRP) several changes clarify NYISO responsibilities and timing of actions related to a backstop regulated solution
 - Section 31.3 (CARIS)

 a clarification removes TPAS from a joint role with ESPWG for consulting on scenarios
 - Section 31.6 (congestion reporting) clarify that NYISO may use an alternative to PROBE to model the unconstrained system



Filing Schedule


- NYISO now seeks approvals to file Sections 31.1 through 31.6
- June 20 BIC/OC
- June 28 Special MC
- July 17 NYISO Board
- FERC filing in July
- FERC order in September (expected)
- October 11 NYISO Order 1000 filing
