

Proposal for Sharing Data with State Commissions and among Market Monitoring Organizations

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Stakeholder process to date

- NYISO proposed these tariff changes at 2 meetings of the Market Issues Working Group
- The Business Issues Committee voted on the amendments on November 3, 2010
- Assuming MC vote today, NYISO will make the FERC filing in December or January, following Board approval



Two goals of the amendments

- Address Order 719 requirements relating to the relationship between the NYISO MMU and State Commissions
- Establish a mechanism to permit the NYISO and the MMU to share confidential information with other ISOs and Market Monitors



The MMU and State Commissions

- Order 719 directed ISOs and RTOs to develop tariff rules governing disclosure of commercially sensitive material by MMUs to State Commissions.
- NYISO May 15, 2009 compliance filing proposed to address "the new/additional confidentiality protections that are needed to permit ISOs/RTOs and the Market Monitoring Units to exchange Protected Information" in the same tariff filing.
- FERC accepted the NYISO proposal. Order on Compliance Filing, Docket No. ER09-1142-000 (November 20, 2009).



What will change

- The tariff currently authorizes State Commissions to request information from the MMU "related to general market trends and the performance of the New York Electric Markets"
- A State Commission request "related to general market trends and the performance of the New York Electric Markets" may call for Protected Information
- The proposed language authorizes, but does not require, the MMU to disclose Protected Information in response to such a request
 - MMU may not provide protected information in response to requests that are designed to aid in State enforcement actions



Effect on a NY Market Participant

- Prior to disclosure of Protected Information the revised tariff will require:
 - Notice to the MP(s) to whom the Protected Information pertains, and an opportunity to object and/or provide "context" for the data
 - Certification by the State Commission that it will protect the information as confidential and assist in preventing further disclosure
 - Certification by the State Commission that it will not use the information in a state enforcement action



What does not change

- No change to NYISO confidentiality rules
- No change in NYISO obligation to respond to orders from the NY PSC



Data sharing among market monitoring organizations


- New language will allow the NYISO and the MMU to exchange Protected Information with other ISOs and market monitoring units in the context of their investigations
- Requesting entities must demonstrate sufficient tariffbased and enforceable protections for the data
- These must include:
 - Continuing protection from disclosure
 - Notice to the NYISO or the MMU of 3d party requests and subpoenas and assistance in preventing or limiting any disclosures
 - No disclosure of information provided by the NYISO/New York
 MMU to a State Commission in response to a request
