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Background

- NYISO has over 6 years of administering its Developer Qualification process under Attachment Y of the OATT
- NYISO initiated review of the Developer Qualification process in order to:
 - Identify opportunities for process improvement by reducing administrative burdens on Developers and NYISO
 - Identify opportunities to reduce uncompensated expenditures by the NYISO in reviewing qualifications

Current Process Overview




Current Process Overview

- Entities must be qualified in order to submit transmission solutions in the NYISO's Comprehensive System Planning Process ("CSPP")
- The qualification process is set forth in:
 - Section 31.2.4 for the Reliability Planning Process
 - Section 31.3.2.4.1 for the Economic Planning Process
 - Section 31.4.4 for the Public Policy Transmission Planning Process
 - Appendix H of the Reliability Planning Process Manual



- In order to become qualified, a Developer is required to submit a Developer Qualification
 Form and include information to demonstrate that it has the requisite experience in developing, financing, and operating a transmission facility.
- Application Process (Typically 30-60 Days)



- A Developer is qualified for three years
- Obligations of Qualified Developers following qualification
 - Submit annual financial statements
 - Notify the NYISO of any material change to information provided in the most recently submitted Developer Qualification Form
- If a Developer wishes to remain qualified at the end of the three-year period, it must submit a new Developer Qualification Form prior to the end of the period



Review of Qualified Developers Following Qualification

- NYISO performs reviews of audited annual financial each year
- NYISO reviews notices of material change when notified by Qualified Developers
- NYISO will also review the additional information on the Qualified Developer's ability to develop, finance, and operate a proposed transmission solution submitted in response to a NYISO solicitation



- If the Developer notifies NYISO of a material change that results in it no longer having the necessary qualifications, then NYISO will notify the Developer is it no longer qualified.
 - Such Developer could reapply by submitting a new Developer
 Qualification Form demonstrating its experience to develop, finance,
 and/or operate a transmission facility in light of the material
 change.

Proposed Process Improvements

Overview

- NYISO incurs costs (*e.g.*, using consultants) in reviewing the technical and financial experience of Developers seeking qualification, and such costs are not currently covered by an application fee similar to other NYISO processes.
- NYISO also incurs costs in conducting an annual review of a Developer's audited financial statement



Proposed Process Improvements

Overview

- Historic Budget Expenses for Technical and Financial Reviews
 - 2021 estimate for current process-\$117,000
 - 2020 actual--\$86,000
 - 2019 actual--\$113,500
- The annual costs vary from year to year
 - Due to the three-year term, the annual costs differ depending on the number of reapplications the NYISO receives each year
 - First time applications can occur at any time



Proposed Process Improvements

NYISO proposes the following process improvements to reduce the administrative burdens on Developers and NYISO and to reduce the uncompensated costs incurred by NYISO in the process:

- Replace the requirement to reapply every three years and to submit audited annual financial statements every year with a biennial recertification
- 2. Require an application fee to cover the majority of the NYISO's expenses in reviewing applications going forward



Require a Biennial Recertification

Proposed Process Improvement:

- Replace the requirement to reapply every three years and to submit audited annual financial statements with an attestation certifying that there have been no material changes to the information provided supporting the Developer's qualification once every two years
- This requirement would apply to new and existing Qualified Developers



Require a Biennial Recertification

Rationale for Proposal:

- Based on NYISO's experience to date, the need to reapply every three years and the annual review of the Developer's audited financial statements results in administrative burdens and costs that outweigh their benefits
 - Qualified Developers are already obligated to report potential material changes to the information submitted by the Developer, which NYISO will review
 - Current provisions in OATT Attachment Y require Developers submitting proposals in one of the NYISO's transmission planning processes to provide updates and additional information on its ability to develop, finance, and operate a transmission facility as a part of its proposed transmission solution



Require a Biennial Recertification

Rationale for Proposal:

- This improvement is intended to retain the value-adding aspects of the annual financial reviews and the three-year renewal requirement at a far lower cost for Qualified Developers and NYISO
- This improvement will also maintain a process control to ensure Developers are reporting material changes
- The requirement to report any material changes to the information provided in the Developer Qualification Form would capture changes to the annual financial statements without the annual requirement to submit and review them



Require an Application Fee

Proposed Process Improvement:

- When a new Developer submits a Developer Qualification Form, it must also submit a \$10,000 non-refundable application fee to the NYISO
 - A Developer Qualification Form will be required for:
 - New applicants
 - Developers wishing to reapply in the event that they become no longer qualified
- Current Qualified Developers will not be required to reapply unless they later become no longer qualified



Require an Application Fee


Rationale for Proposal:

- The application fee is intended to cover the reasonable costs of the application-related financial and technical reviews by the NYISO, as well as other administrative costs associated with the processing the Developer Qualification Form.
- NYISO will continue to budget for the following expenses, but at a reduced amount:
 - Day-to-day costs of administering the process
 - Consultant assistance in reviewing material changes
 - Costs in reviewing unique applications that exceed the application fee (i.e., \$10,000)
