Analysis Requests

- Augment the Brattle Analysis with year 2022
 - Analysis is underway
 - Anticipated to be complete for discussion at the November 26, 2018 IPPTF meeting



Lower 2030 RGGI Estimate

- The NYISO does not recommend this analysis as it would not be informative based on the results provided to date
- As RGGI is adjusted downward in both the Change Case (with carbon pricing) and the Status Quo Case (without carbon pricing), the other parts of the analysis approximately scale. Since the overall impact is near zero, the scaled impact is near zero.

- Consider the effects of carbon pricing on repowering and on retention
 - Analysis is underway
 - Anticipated to be complete for discussion at the November 26, 2018 IPPTF meeting

- Consider consequences of no carbon pricing, including estimates of the costs of various buyer side mitigation scenarios
 - The NYISO is still considering how it might structure such an analysis
 - Update to be provided at November 26, 2018 IPPTF meeting

- Consider consequences of AC transmission project
 - The NYISO is still considering how it might structure such an analysis
 - Update to be provided at November 26, 2018 IPPTF meeting

- Consider the benefits of carbon pricing impacts without CES and/or non-achievement of 50% by 2030 renewable goal
 - The NYISO is still considering how it might structure such an analysis
 - Update to be provided at November 26, 2018 IPPTF meeting



Data Requests

- The NYISO has provided additional information regarding:
 - Price induced demand
 - Demand elasticity assumptions
 - Explanation of high 2030 RGGI assumption
 - NOx reductions
 - Separating the analysis effects of existing REC contracts and future REC contracts
